

At the August 8th Village Board meeting two Island Lake police officers were recognized for their heroic actions. On February 28th, 2013 at 8:59pm Detective Scott Johnson arrived to assist a sheriff's office call prior to the Lake County Sheriff's deputies for a domestic disturbance.

Upon arrival he found a female who had poured gasoline over herself and was attempting to light herself on fire. Without regard for his own safety, Detective Johnson stepped into the puddle of gasoline, removed the lighter from the woman's possession and calmly spoke with her until assist units and the Wauconda fire District arrived on the scene. Detective Johnson was presented with the Valor Award.

May 25, 2012 officer Gale Holford responded to an Assist Ambulance scene and arrived prior to the Wauconda Fire Rescue where he found a young male who had overdosed. Upon arrive Officer Holford found the male unconscious, not breathing and non-responsive. Officer Holford immediately began chest compressions. After several minutes, the male began breathing on his own but shortly thereafter stopped breathing again. Officer Holford began chest compressions again and did not stop until properly relieved by the Wauconda Fire District paramedics. The young male survived. Officer Holford was presented with a Life Saving Award. Congratulations to you both!



## Water Department

### McHenry County Water Main Replacement Project

Chicagoland Paving Contractors Inc., is expected to begin resurfacing (the final lift of asphalt) during the last two weeks of September on the following streets: Charles Court, Circle Drive South, Hazel Court, Midway Drive (the section by Hazel Court) and Highland Drive (between Hazel Court and Hillside Drive.)

### David Court and Hyacinth Terrace Water Main Replacement Project

Call Construction, Inc. has completed the construction of 860 linear feet of 8" and 70 linear feet of 6" diameter water mains on David Court and Hyacinth Terrace. The project also included 3 new fire hydrants and 1 new water main valve. The street and landscaping restoration should be completed in the very near future. The water service stubs have also been installed and residents can and should begin hooking up to the new water mains. The deadline to complete these hookups is August 18, 2014. ## Victory Garden



### Dartmouth Drive Water Main Replacement

The land survey has been completed and the engineering design is underway. After the Village completes the budget process, construction should begin in 2014. We will keep the residents in the area informed via mail or hand carried letters as decisions and timeframes become established.

### Water Tower Maintenance

#### Westridge Water Tower Repainting Project

The project is underway, with the sandblasting containment tarp having been installed starting on August 13, 2013. The tower was constructed in 1991 and cleaned up and over coated with new paint in 2004. Because there was coating failures on the exterior and the interior of the tower. The current project will consist of removing the entire old paint coating system with abrasive blast cleaning. The tower will then be repainted with a prime coat, intermediate coat and a final coat. The project is expected to take 45 to 60 days.

The following subdivisions will be affected with an Outdoor Water Use Ban until the project is complete: Westridge, Campbell Woods, Pine Ridge and those residing on Ridge Road.

The water ban has been put into effect for this area to ensure that the water pressure and quantity of water does not drop to a level that could create adverse conditions.

The Victory Garden has been a success. Residents enjoyed an abundance of produce from their gardens. The gardens beds were sold out with many requests for new ones. In response 12 more planting beds are planned. Folks that currently have gardens are asked to clean up their gardens and help build the new ones on October 12th. More volunteers are needed to help build and fill the extra beds so bring your wheelbarrow, shovels and rakes on October 12th to the Veteran's Park Victory Garden. ## Lake News

By Lake Management Committee

The Lake Management Committee assisted the Village in implementing a Lake Management Program for 2013 with Clarke Aquatic Services. This program began with Clarke completing a survey of the weed situation in our lake. After completion of the survey, the Lake Management Committee chose to treat the 50 foot perimeter of the lake. The treatment targeted Curly Leaf Pondweed and Eurasian Watermilfoil and was done on July 2nd. Clarke did a repeat assessment on July 25th and the result exceeded the expectation for this treatment plan. To continue with the weed theme, Duckweed continues to be a challenge. Since treatment with chemicals is not feasible with duckweed, the committee is investigating other containment/removal options.

Have you seen that guy cruisin' the lake in the police boat? That is Wayne Schnell, the new Compliance Officer. The Committee is grateful to have someone assisting with monitoring boat stickers and other lake compliance issues, but the most important benefit of having Wayne around is that hopefully his presence will encourage people to remember SAFETY FIRST when boating! The Committee is close to making recommendations to the Board on the following topics:

- 1) Possession limits for some of the species of fish
- 2) A combined project with the Historical Society offering Pontoon Boat Tours throughout the year
- 3) Motor size and No-wake issues
- 4) Use of Island Lake to be restricted to residents and their guests only

The committee meets monthly and WELCOMES public participation. Please confirm meeting dates and times on the Village web page.

## ILLINOIS PUTS A PRICE ON FUN IN THE WATER

Before heading down the river to inner tube, or hit up the lake to kayak or canoe, be sure you've paid the price. As of July 1st, In Illinois, you are now required to carry a \$6.00 Water Use Sticker for all non-powered watercraft. Before this regulation, titling and registration were needed for things like kayaks and canoes. Those are no longer required.

Also, life jackets are now required for all non-powered watercraft, including inner tubes. Operators of tubes can be arrested for OWI (operating while intoxicated).

Water Use Stickers can be purchased at any DNR point-of-sale vendor. They are valid from January 1st-December 31st.

Military families are allowed to use coupons, even expired ones, up to six months after they have expired overseas. These would be the coupons that are in the newspaper on Sunday. They would not need to be cut out. The entire insert may be donated. A donation box is at the front door.

Marion's Angels are also collecting plastic grocery bags to make mats for the homeless.





### **Care & Respect**

The U.S. Flag should always be treated with the utmost care and respect. Remember, the flag represents a living country and, as such, is considered a living symbol. Always display the flag with the blue union field up -- never display the flag upside down, except as a distress signal. Always carry the flag aloft and free -- never carry it flat or horizontally in processions or parades. >Always keep the flag clean and safe. The flag is a symbol of us all -- of all America. It is not

a political symbol. It is a symbol that each American should respect, for it represents the honor, courage and sacrifice of those who struggled to deliver freedom, justice and opportunity to all Americans.

### **Platform on Floor**

When displayed on the floor or on a platform, the flag is given the place of honor, always positioned behind the speaker and to the speaker's right with other flags, if any, at the left. The "right" as the position of honor was established from the time when the "right hand" was the "weapon hand." The right hand raised without a weapon was a sign of peace. The right hand, to any observer, is the observer's left.

### **Final Groupings**

The Flag of The United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states, localities or societies are grouped for display.

### **Against A Wall**

When displaying the flag against a wall, vertically or horizontally, the flag's union (stars) should be at the top, to the flag's own right, and the observer's left.

### **Crossed Staffs**

When another flag is displayed with the U.S. Flag and the staffs are crossed, the Flag of the United States is placed on its own right with its staff in front of the other flag.

### **Several Flags on one Pole**

When several flags are flown from the same flag pole, the U.S. Flag should always be at the top -- except during church services by naval chaplains at sea when the church pennant may be flown above the U.S. Flag on the ship's mast. Flags of sovereign nations should not be flown on the same pole as the United States Flag but from separate poles.

### **On a Staff From a Window**

When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting from a window, balcony, or a building, the union should be at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half-staff.

### **Across a Street**

When the flag is hung on a wire or cable across a street, it should be hung vertically with the union to the north or east. If the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending from a structure to a pole at the outer edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be displayed with the union (field of stars) furthest from the building.

### **On Separate Flag Poles with Other Flags**

When flown with flags of States, communities, or societies on separate and adjacent flagpoles that are of the same height and in a straight line, the Flag of the United States is always placed in the position of honor -- to its own right.

When a group of flags from States or localities or pennants of societies, the flag should be at the center and at the highest point. The other flags may be smaller but none may be larger. No other flag ever should be placed above the U.S. Flag. The Flag of the United States is always the first flag raised and the last to be lowered when flags are flown from adjacent flagpoles.

When hung with the national banner of other countries, each flag must be displayed from a separate pole of the same height. Each flag should be approximately the same size. They should be raised and lowered simultaneously. The flag of one nation may not be displayed above that of another nation.

### **Parades and Review**

The flag should be in front of the marchers. At the moment the flag passes in a parade or procession, all persons should show respect by standing at attention facing the flag with their right hand over their hearts. Persons in uniform should face the flag and render their formal salute. During a parade it is appropriate to salute only the first United States Flag. When other flags are included, the United States Flag should be centered in front of the others or carried to their right.

### **Raising and Lowering**

The flag should be raised briskly and lowered slowly and ceremoniously. Ordinarily it should be displayed only between sunrise and sunset. It should be illuminated if displayed at night. The Flag of the United States of America is saluted as it is hoisted and lowered. The salute is held until the flag is unsnapped from the halyard or through the last note of the National Anthem; whichever is the longest.

### **Inclement Weather**

When the flag is flying and the weather turns to rain, sleet, and snow or otherwise, it is proper to leave it flying if it is made of all-weather material. All-weather flags can be purchased. Flags made to fly in and withstand high wind situations may also be purchased.

### **Illumination of the Flag**

If displayed at night, the flag must be properly illuminated. Proper illumination means that the stars and stripes can be seen readily from a reasonable distance.

### **Half-Staff**

To position the flag at half-staff, first hoist the flag to the peak of the staff for an instant and then, in respect for the deceased, lower it to the half-staff position -- roughly halfway between the top and bottom of the staff. Before lowering it for the day, raise the flag again to the peak of the pole.

The death of principal figures of the United States Government and the governor of a state, territory, or possession, as a mark of respect to their memory. In the event of the death of other officials or foreign dignitaries, the flag is to be displayed at half-staff according to U.S. Presidential instructions, or in accordance with recognized customs. In the event of the death of a present or former official of the government, any state, territory, or possession may proclaim that the National Flag shall be flown at half-staff. The flag shall be flown at half-staff for thirty days following the death of the President or a former President; ten days following the day of death of the Vice President, the Chief Justice or a retired Chief Justice of the United States, or the Speaker of the House of Representatives; from the day of death until interment of a former Vice president or the governor of a state, territory, or possession; and on the day of death and the following day for a member of Congress.

### **Covering a Casket**

When used to cover a casket, the flag should be placed with the blue field covering the head and over the left shoulder. The flag should not be lowered into the grave or touch the ground at any time. The flag should never be used as the covering for a headstone or other statue or monument.

When taken from the casket, the flag should be formally and properly folded as a triangle with only the stars showing. Triangular plastic or glass storage cases on a wood base may be purchased to hold the folded flag. The deceased may be shown respect by attaching an inscribed plaque of recognition on the base of the storage case.

Draping the casket with a United States Flag is an honor reserved for veterans or highly regarded state and national figures. Several organizations have defined the meaning of each fold when folding a flag from a casket. These are unique and original with each organization. None are official or included in the Flag Code. For more information please contact the National Flag Foundation.

### **Folding the Flag**

To properly fold the U.S. Flag, follow these steps:

1. Two people face each other, each holding one end of the flag. Stretch it horizontally at waist height and fold in half lengthwise.
2. Fold the flag in half lengthwise again, the union (stars) should be on the top.
3. One person holds the flag by the union while the other starts at the opposite end by making a triangular fold.
4. Continue to fold in the flag in triangles from the stripes end until only the blue field with stars is showing.

### **Gold Fringe on the Flag**

Gold fringe frequently decorates the Flag of the United States, but it has no known record of symbolism and no meaning in national or international protocol. Fringe has long and frequently been used on military and organizational flags; it remains an embellishment without meaning. It is purely a decorative and optional addition. The Flag Code makes no reference to the use of fringe, cord and tassel, and no law or regulation either requires or prohibits the placing of gold fringe on the flag.

### **Retiring the Flag From Service**

"The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem of display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." (The United States Flag Code) The flag should be burned in private at a private, non-public location. In many American communities, one or more organizations render an important community service by collecting and overseeing the proper disposal of old, worn, tattered, frayed and/or faded U.S. Flags.

A flag retirement ceremony may also be a family activity. It provides an opportunity to teach and instruct. If retiring the flag as a family the following steps might be considered:

1. Gather the family around. Raise the flag on the pole or staff or hold it aloft by hand.
2. Call the group to attention salute and recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.
3. The leader might say something like "This flag has served its nation well and long. It is now worn to a condition in which it should no longer be used to represent the nation. We pay honor to this flag for the service it has rendered."
4. Fold the flag according to procedures explained on this site
5. Give the flag to the group leader who will burn it until it is completely consumed.

### **When to Fly the Flag**

The flag may be displayed on any, or every day, subject to the conventions explained elsewhere on this site. On the days below it is particularly appropriate to display the flag.
