Thank you for your patience during the renovation of the front entrance to the Village Hall and apologies for any inconvenience caused by the construction. Once construction is finished, a concrete ramp and an electronic door openers will

make the entrance handicapped accessible. This project was made possible by a Lake County Community Development Block Grant.

Additional handicapped parking will be available

by the main entrance in the area where part of the canopy was removed, as part of the renovation. We will also be repaying the entire parking lot.

The problem we have now is that we ran out of good weather to finish the project. We will complete the renovations in the Spring.

Due to the cold weather coming early, we have also had to put off until spring some road paving projects in several areas of the Village.

The Village of Island Lake will soon make available to residents a program enabling them to receive various alerts regarding public safety and other community-related messages. In early September, those who have landlines will receive a message about the new program.

For mobile phones you will be able to opt in by texting 888-777 and entering 60042 in the message. You will then receive a text from Nixle Public Safety with instructions and the option for adding an email address.



Once the program goes live, there will be a link on the Village website (villageofislandlake.com) for opting in.

With the shorter days and the change of the clocks, it most definitely fall in Island Lake. It's dark early, it's cold and the kids are in the midst of their school year. Snow arrived early—just before Halloween this year. It's always a good time to remind motorists to *slow down*. We routinely receive speeding auto complaints in our many subdivisions. Even when cars are operating at the posted speed limits, it can look dangerous to walkers, children and others when in a residential area. When we do cite offenders, we find it is most likely the subdivision residents themselves who are speeding. This isn't surprising because—other than on cut-through streets—the majority of traffic on residential he residents who live there

streets consists of the residents who live there.

The dark of winter comes before 5:00pm and children are still out and about. Odds are increased for cars to slide on seasonal slick roads. Increase your stopping distance on slick roads to avoid accidents. This makes safe speeds from traffic even more important. Don't let the impatient driver behind you pressure you into speeding up; *operate at a safe and comfortable speed*.

You've probably noticed several officers sporting neatly trimmed facial hair. In November of

this year, the police department began growing facial hair to participate in *Mowvember*, an annual November event designed to raise awareness of "some of the biggest health issues faced by men: prostate cancer, testicular cancer, and mental health and suicide prevention." It encourages men to get involved by increasing attention to early cancer detection, diagnosis and obtaining effective treatments. The ultimate goal is to reduce the number of preventable deaths. Additionally, it encourages annual check-ups, asks that men be aware of a family history of cancer and promotes adoption of healthier lifestyles.


Water Department - Patrick Stewart, Water Superintendent



Flush your Hot Water Tank!

Does your water ever have discoloration, odor or low flow when taking a shower or using hot water at any of your faucets? Do you ever hear crackling in your hot water tank when it tries to heat? This is normally a sign that requires your water heater be flushed. Over time your hot water tank collects and builds

sediment from naturally occurring minerals and the sediment will usually rest at the bottom of the tank. Not only does this cause water quality issues, but also forms an insulator at the bottom of the tank forcing the heater to work harder and require more time and energy to heat your water. Most manufacturers recommend flushing your tank annually. Flush your hot water tank today!



Winter is Coming!

Cold weather is here! This is our yearly reminder to residents who have

plumbing susceptible to freezing, now is the time to insulate, heat, seal! Residents should also know it is their responsibility to keep the water meter inside their home from freezing. A water meter that freezes can become very expensive. Not only will the meter have to be replaced at cost, but any broken/leaking meters that occur outside normal working hours will be considered non-emergency, and service charges will apply.



On another note, please DO NOT bury fire hydrants with snow. The hydrants are there for a reason; please make sure our fire fighters can find them in the event of an emergency!

Storm Sewer Cleanup

You may have seen us around town vacuuming leaves in the area of street curbs and storm sewers. Last year the Village acquired a "Billy Goat" vacuum attachment for our Public Works trucks. It allows us to collect debris that builds up against curbs and on top of storm sewers. The Billy Goat is not large enough to do

residential leaf collection but it works well to keep the storm sewers from clogging and help prevent flooding.

Fall repaving projects had to be rescheduled to spring, unfortunately, due to winter showing up on Halloween. Temperatures need to stay at be 45° for payment to adhere to the road surface. Roads to be resurfaced include Knightsbridge Drive, Revere Lane, Westminster cul-de-sac and Lexington Drive west of Westminster. **The Village Hall parking lot will also be repaved** and new handicapped parking spaces added by the main entrance to the building in the area that is now surrounded by bright orange plastic fencing. Pardon our dust while we work on these improvements.

Snow Removal Season Reminders

- Arterial streets are priority, for example: Eastway, Burnett, Waterford Way, Hale Lane, Newport Drive, Carriage Hill Road, and Westridge Drive.
- $\sqrt{}$ Do not shovel, blow or plow snow onto the street. (Village ordinance prohibits it.)
- $\sqrt{Park your vehicle off the street}$ when it starts to snow. This allows crews to clear the entire roadway and prevents the car from being plowed in, ticketed or towed.
- \checkmark Please show the snow plowing crew courtesy. They are out there to make your travel safe.
- Try to clear snow around fire hydrants. This simple step could save precious time in emergencies.
- √ Remove portable items from the road right-of-way—for example, basketball hoops, benches and decor. The Village is not responsible for damage to these items resulting from snow removal operations.
- $\sqrt{}$ Mailboxes will be repaired by Public Works *only if we hit them with the snowplow*. The post and the box should be strong enough to withstand the weight of snow from the plow. (Letters were sent to owners of mailboxes identified as needing repair or replacement.)

Building Department — Russell Kraly, Building Official



It's hard to believe that I've been here for four months. Time flies. We've been busy catching up on permits and inspections, but we are now up to date and moving forward.

Fall has come and winter has reared its ugly head! First snowfall of the year and none of us was ready for what Mother Nature did. Most people haven't cleaned up their yards and put away the lawn furniture or anything else!

Potential Hazards with Leaves: Rake up your leaves and get them picked up. They can block storm sewers and culverts in the Village and contribute to flooding problems. Also, clean the leaves out of your gutters so they don't block your downspouts. Freezing temperatures, can cause ice back up and push frozen materials under the first few layers of shingles. Newer homes have ice and water shield under the shingle, which helps keep the moisture out of the house. In older homes with older shingles, ice under the shingles can melt and drip water on insulation and drywall and cause stains and possible mold problems. If you see a brownish looking stain on your ceiling it means you have a water leak somewhere and need to address it as soon as possible.

Permit Checklist: When you apply for permits to do projects around your house, make sure you bring the all the required paperwork with you. Attached to each permit application is a simple checklist developed by our building department staff to help you organize your papers.

- □ Permit Application, filled out completely
- Contractor registration
- □ Plat of Survey/Drawing, when applicable
- □ Homeowners Association (HOA) Approval Letter, when applicable
- Proposal/Contract

We will not accept the Permit Application if you don't have all of your paperwork because we cannot process it without the items on the checklist. Applications can be processed more quickly and efficiently if everything is in order. We don't want to misplace your important documents; it is a challenge to keep incomplete paperwork in order.

Thank you for your cooperation in helping us make the permitting process painless and more streamlined for all!

An Owner Transfer Inspection (OTI) is required before the sale of a property. See the checklist on our website at the link below. Rental Inspections and Registrations are also required at all rental units.

Winter started early. How about that early cold and snow in October! This winter will be as the others with cold temperatures and snow.



Safety is key when wet heavy snow accumulates. Winter can be fun for sledding and snow-ball fights—and yes, shoveling snow. If the snow/slush is too heavy to lift, push it to the side and do not try and lift it. Having a snow blower can be a good investment of equipment to remove snow. *Always read the instructions before operating.* The old fashion method of shoveling is still popular; be sure to purchase a long handle light weight shovel, make sure to use your legs and good slip resistant boots. **Prepare a winter safety kit for home and your car** (items to consider are bottle water, blankets, flashlight, matches/

lighter, batteries, tool kit, small shovel, can-opener and a source of food).

Did you replace the batteries in your smoke detector/s and carbon monoxide detector/s to protect your family and pets? Please do so!

I want to thank our volunteers for their dedication and support, on behalf of the Village of Island Lake Emergency Management Agency, Our Emergency Management Meetings are held the fourth Wednesday of the month at the Village Hall at 19:00/7:00pm. Volunteers are welcome. I ask that you be an active team member, taking part in all the training exercises and be ready to support our Village upon request.

Lake Management Committee – Ken Wick (LMC)

As another summer comes to an end and ice starts to form, please be cautious when you are on the lake; *keep away from open water and slushy areas*. Remember, dark ice is often NOT safe!

In order to provide natural oxygen in the lake during the winter months, the Lake Management Committee would like to encourage you to shovel an ice-skating rink or small area on the lake. When the snow is removed from areas of the ice, sunlight can penetrate, which helps create oxygen in the water called Photosynthesis. This is especially important during the winter months. Clearing just a small area can contribute to a healthy oxygen levels. The smaller bays are most affected in the winter.

As a courtesy, please do not drill any ice-fishing holes or drive snowmobiles or ATV's within shoveled areas or ice skating rinks—especially around our public parks. These areas are maintained for the enjoyment of ice-skating and hockey.

Snowmobile and ATV speed limits must be observed. Speed Limit for snowmobiles and ATV's are:

- (Five) 5 mph before 10 am and after sunset.
- Maximum speed for snowmobiles and ATV's is 20 (twenty) mph after 10am and before sunset only

In order to provide a sustaining fishery for future generations, *fish harvesting regulations will be strictly enforced*—especially during the ice-fishing season. Regulations are posted below and available in the Lake handbook or at the Village Hall.

Village Board to Consider Cannabis Ordinance

State of Illinois law will allow adults over 21 to legally purchase cannabis for recreational use from licensed dispensaries, effective January 1, 2020. However, the law prohibits use of cannabis in public places.

While municipalities cannot prohibit the personal recreational use allowed by Illinois law, they can pass ordinances through local zoning authority to limit or prohibit the location of cannabis businesses. They can also impose a tax of up to 3% on purchases of cannabis.

The Planning and Zoning Commission held a public hearing on October 17, 2020 to consider the zoning issues. The Village Board will consider a cannabis ordinance at the December 12, 2019 meeting.

Historical Society of Island Lake – Connie Mascillino



This house was likely the most unique home in the history of Island Lake. There were no neighboring homes; the yard surrounding it was downright huge; it had the best view of the lake; and it couldn't be reached by car.


In the 60's, the Ghisell family of Evanston purchased the Island and built a summer home on it. The two bedroom home had a river rock fireplace, hardwood floors and an enclosed porch. The property also included a small parcel of land on the north end of Landsend Ct. Access to the island was only via boat.

How do you get supplies to and from the island, especially when ice was forming and breaking up—roughly a four-month timespan? The challenge faced those making a year-round home there.

Planning to make it a park, the Village purchased the island from Mr. Ghisell for \$65,000 in 1979. Neal DeYoung, a Village water department employee, moved into the house and became "caretaker" of the property, rowing his way to and from work. The last inhabitants were a young married couple who rented the house four years and paid rent of \$50 per month.

When the drought of 1988 dried up the part of the lake that surrounded the island, a path was made from Midway Drive to the island to allow the Wauconda Fire District to do a controlled burn of the abandoned house. That end of an era began the Village's quest to finally make the island a park.

WAUCONDA FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT



The tools of firefighting have come a long way since the early days of volunteer bucket brigades. Originally formed as the Wauconda Niagara Fire Company in 1889, the Wauconda Fire District now serves approximately 40,000 people in several communities and some unincorporated areas of Lake

and McHenry Counties 'round the clock with state-of-the-art equipment and highly trained personnel. On Saturday, September 28, 2019 at Station 2 in Island Lake, the District introduced a 2019



Rosenbauer Commander Fire Engine, designed especially for service in Island Lake.

Winter Safety Tips

Numbers to keep in mind. (approximate)

- \Rightarrow 47,000 fires occur during the winter season in the U.S.
- \Rightarrow 240 house fires start from Christmas trees
- ⇒ **350 people are injured** every year by broken lights
- \Rightarrow **150 house fires** are caused by holiday lights
- ⇒ 11% of Christmas tree fires are caused by candles; 20% are caused a tree too close heat source
- ⇒ **Top 3 days** for home candle fires: Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day

Holiday Tree and Decorations Safety:

- A UL-listed, "flame resistant/retardant" artificial tree is a safer option to a fresh tree.
 For fresh trees, choose one that needles don't easily fall off and add water to it every day; place your tree at least 3 feet away from all heat sources; take down and recycle tree less than 4 weeks after putting it up.—Don't Burn—-
- **Do not overload extension cords**; Replace worn, old or damaged extension cords right away.
- Keep candles away from flammable objects; consider using flameless candles for your holiday decorations.
- Turn off all decoration lights before you go to bed AND while you're away from your home.
- **Take down outside decorations sooner than later** to help them last longer; replace damaged decorations by hitting up sales after the holidays.

Install smoke alarms on EACH LEVEL of your home, in or near your kitchen, and in sleeping areas.

Keep snow and ice 3 feet away from fire hydrants.


