What does warmer weather bring to mind? High on our priority list is *road work*. Our Public Works Director and our Engineer assess our roads, determine which are in most need of repair, and select projects that we can afford to complete with the funds we have. Slated for repaving 2023 are Portsmouth, Debden, Wayside and Kelly.

Respect our parks! They also become a priority in warm weather. We have repaired/refurbished the ball fields and basketball court at the Village Hall, installed new signs at parks with the rules and cleaned up other parks with the help of volunteers. Sadly, recurring vandalism and other abuse of parks is costly and demoralizing. Public Works and volunteers should not have to pick up litter and dog waste. Security cameras for parks are part of our budget considerations.

Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Budget work is in progress. The bulk of our revenue is personal property tax. Other sources include sales tax, Motor Fuel Tax (which must be spent on road projects), video gaming tax and cannabis tax. We also apply for grants for like the ones awarded for lake projects and seek donations. We are actively seeking business development to increase revenue. The dispensary due to open late spring/early summer will significantly increase our sales tax revenue.

2023 Events Calendar is on our website. It includes old favorites—like Concerts in the Park, Lake Fest/Carnival, National Night Out and OktoberFest—and proposed new ones. Volunteers are working hard on fundraising and planning.

The Village office closes daily from 12:30 – 1:30 p.m.

The 2023 Hydrant Flushing Schedule to be announced: *Signs for Hydrant Flushing will be placed in each subdivision prior to work start.* Residents are advised to use caution before doing laundry, as hydrant flushing can stir up naturally occurring minerals that can stain fabrics.

Plumbing "Need to Know" for Homeowners: Plumbing can be an "out of sight, out of mind" issue — at least until you suspect a leak. Residents should locate their water meter to do a quick check for water use. Water meters are normally right next to the shutoff valve. It's the small triangular dial or symbol that spins when water is flowing through it. *If you are not using water and you see the dial spinning, you likely have a leak somewhere.* Check toilets, faucets,

and spigots. If you find a leak, *it is critical to find the main shut off valve* to stop the water flow. The shutoff valve is located where the water service line enters their home, normally in a crawl space or basement. If your home is built on a slab the valve will be near your hot water tank.

Toilet Maintenance: We have seen an alarming number of high water use due to leaking toilets. Leaking toilets run through water quickly and may easily missed. *A leak 1/4" in diameter over a 3 month period can leak up to 886,000 gallons of water.* Flap valves in the bottom of your toilet tank are most often the culprit, and should be replaced every 1-2 years to prevent unwanted leaks.

<u>Meter Reading Upgrades</u>: The water department will be replacing existing meter reading devices located on the exterior of homes. Residents will see two water department employees walking in their backyards during this process; ask for their badges if you are concerned. We apologize for any inconvenience.

Public Works, continued Storm Damage to Trees: The public works department will remove branches that have fallen due to storm damage only. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to bring branches to the curb after each storm.

Water Conservation! As the heat of summer approaches, water use increases. So will your water bill! Tips to conserve water: 1) Plant drought resistant lawns shrubs and plants and mulch around them to retain moisture. 2) Water during the early morning to reduce the amount of evaporation. 3) Check for leaks in pipes hoses and spigots. Whether it's for 20 minutes or 20 hours all of the drips add up and your water meter will most definitely track them.

Be vigilant for increased outdoor activity. Spring has officially arrived. Warmer temperatures and increased hours of sunlight will inevitably lead to increased outdoor activities. Building and Code Enforcement

Permit applications are on our website on the "Forms" tab. Processing takes 7-10 working days. Lead time for scheduling inspections is 24 hours. Orange permit cards must be displayed in the window. Fines apply for starting work without a permit.

2020 International and National Electrical Codes

apply. Permits are required for interior work that involves adding or changing location of electricity, plumbing or gas line. We do not have copies of plats of survey. We cannot provide advice for building projects.

the police department is enforcing non-compliance. If your vehicle is registered in Island Lake, the Village requires the local sticker (Village Code, Title 7, Chap. 2).

Refer to the Village Code, Title 8 on our website for building regulations. Consider getting a professional for your building projects.

Code Enforcement: Respect your neighbors and respect your property by keeping it groomed and free of debris. Spring weather provides a good opportunity to clean up. Common code complaints are unlicensed/inoperable vehicles, and yard debris. If code violations are resolved 14 days from the date of citation, fines will not apply.
